



From conflict to understanding, from trauma to hope - a journey into the souls of four people who are transforming their searing pain into a bridge for reconciliation.

SYNOPSIS

THE NARROW BRIDGE is a searching journey into the souls of four people who, after searing pain, develop strengths they never had before. We watch with wonder as Bushra, Rami, Meytal and Bassam, women and men who lost a child or parent in violent conflict, transform their grief into a bridge for reconciliation.

The film follows their paths from devastating trauma to courageous activism. But their stories are not just personal. They all belong to a controversial grassroots movement of broken-hearted people 'Israeli Palestinian Bereaved Families' who stand side-by-side to end the violence and build a future based on dignity and equality. Despite fierce political and family opposition, they refuse to give up.

Bushra, Rami, Meytal and Bassam all wish they could turn back time to before tragedy struck, but they would never change who they have become. Charting a journey of hope amidst pain, THE NARROW BRIDGE lights a way to personal and social change.



FOUR COURAGEOUS PEOPLE

Rami, Bushra, Meytal and Bassam are compelling individuals; articulate, passionate and frank. Their candid interviews reveal how the violent deaths of their child or parent affected them. They have each travelled a hero's journey with a transformation that is startling and complex.

As we follow these four people through aching loss, internal struggles and courageous shifts in thinking, the film explores who they used to be, who they are now and how the experience of trauma changed them. After meeting the other through grief, Rami, Bushra, Meytal and Bassam understood the need to change the fear and mistrust in both Israeli and Palestinian societies. They saw that conflict resolution requires bottom-up change in civil society as well as top-down political processes.

They are now all part of a people-to-people peacebuilding movement working hard to change the culture of conflict from the ground up. Their many activities include talks to Israeli and Palestinian high school students, workshops for bereaved adults, women's parallel narrative groups and an annual Memorial for Victims of Conflict where the suffering on both sides is witnessed. Although they face fierce opposition from family, community and government in both Palestinian and Israeli societies, they refuse to give up.

DISTRIBUTION

THE NARROW BRIDGE was completed in 2022 and had a local festival release in the director/producer's home country of Australia where it received wonderful responses and won the Audience Award. Soon after it also won the Audience Award at the 42nd San Francisco Jewish Film Festival.

The film is being distributed globally by Filmoption International and Menemsha Films, and in Australia and New Zealand by Bonsai Films. The film's Building Bridges impact program, designed to increase awareness of people-to-people peace building projects, is being launched in October 2022 to coincide with the high-profile speaking tour of Bassam Aramin and Rami Elhanan (the two men in the film) across Australia.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

As the writer-director of *THE NARROW BRIDGE*, I'm also a child and adult trauma psychologist. Based mostly in Melbourne, Australia I see children and adults in my private practice and have delivered workshops on Understanding and Healing Trauma locally and internationally.

Over the last decade I've also been consulting regularly as a psychologist with Palestinians and Israelis in a Jerusalem hospital. Through that work I've seen the effects of the ongoing conflict - how fear and hate grow on both sides. But I've also seen how grief levels people, drawing them down into life's essentials, creating a bond. It was during my time there I met my four film participants. Over the five years of making the documentary we have developed a collaborative and trusting relationship.

Rami, Bushra, Meytal and Bassam are all compelling individuals; articulate, passionate and frank. They want their story told and speak out despite walls of overwhelming opposition. Their candid interviews reveal how the violent killing of their child or parent affected them, changing their body, mind and spirit. And yet, through their experiences we witness how pain can become a springboard toward empathy. Each of them has travelled a hero's journey with a transformation that is startling and complex.

As I was working on this film, I became aware that being a psychologist and a filmmaker at the same time is complicated. When Rami tells me he wakes up at night sweating with nightmares, I know he's still suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. At times my roles conflict as I push people to revisit their pain. I have been very careful not to re-traumatise Bushra, Meytal, Bassam or Rami. Rather the film focuses on their journeys from searing grief to post traumatic growth as they discovered a newfound sense of personal strengths amidst their loss. Like Bushra says 'I started believing in myself. That I'm a strong woman with the self-esteem and courage to face life with all its beauty and challenges.'

Amazed by their strength and compassion I set out on a journey to understand how these four people met the human face of their enemy; how grief changed their identities and how their broken hearts filled with the wisdom of compromise - allowing them to harness their pain into a powerful tool for reconciliation.

Finally on a personal note, I try to understand why I've chosen to make this particular documentary? As I film, I've put myself in some uncomfortable and dangerous situations. My deepest response is I've been humbled by the courage and empathy of Rami, Bushra, Meytal and Bassam. As I followed their transformative paths, I kept seeing these people could be a model for others dealing with trauma, and conflict, across the world. I truly sense their struggle to become the best version of themselves speaks to us all as we deal with the pain and conflict in our lives.


